ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

Assistive Technology may often be considered for children with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities to help them learn, communicate and function more independently. It can be **Low-Tech**, like picture cards, stop signs or white boards, or more **High-Tech** equipment like iPad, text-to-speech, Smartboards, or augmentative communication devices like a Dynavox. There are several sources where individuals can acquire assistive technology like special education programs and assistive technology companies. To secure a device, the applicant must provide medical evidence of a diagnosis, including a clinician's recommendation for assistive technology. If determined medically necessary, some assistive technology may be covered by health insurance, or even Medicaid.

If deemed academically necessary through a child's Individualized Education Plan (IEP), their school district will provide assistive technology during school, and in some cases, for the child to use at home. Parents should always consult with their child's teacher, and/or pediatrician first to assist in the acquisition of assistive technology to support their child's specific needs. The Medical Nutrition Therapy for Prevention Program (MNT4P) for inherited metabolic disorders provides temporary coverage of medical foods for patients experiencing financial difficulties in the state of Georgia.

Eligible patients: Typically have no healthcare coverage OR are battling with insurance for coverage of the requested product and do not have access to alternative sources of coverage:

Children with Katie Beckett Medicaid may have part of their family's monthly premium's private insurance plan reimbursed to them if the state deems it cost effective to do so. A specific formula is used by the State of Georgia to determine if it would be cost effective to reimburse their private insurance plan's monthly premium. Not everyone receiving Katie Beckett will be approved for this benefit called the Health Insurance Premium Payment Program (HIPP). If a family is denied HIPP, they may still be eligible to have a portion of their monthly premium reimbursed under the Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization program (CHIPRA) but eligibility is still not a guarantee as the state will still need to determine if it's cost effective to pay the reimbursement.
- **49.** GEORGIA PEDIATRIC PROGRAM (GAPP)-a program for Medicaid eligible medically fragile children in Georgia under the age of 21 meeting an institutional medical level of care equivalent to that of a skilled nursing care facility (SNF).

a program for Medicaid eligible individuals that meet both (1) institutional level of care requirements and are considered by the Georgia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities (DBHDD) to be (2) "Most in Need" of either a NOW or COMP waiver at the time of application, or if they've exhausted all other community resources available to them. Some applicants who apply may be determined eligible for meeting the level of care requirement, but if they do not meet the Most in Need requirement at the time of application, they will be placed on the "Planning List" until they meet eligibility. Planning list applicants typically are individuals under the age of 22. HOUSING OPTIONS

Housing continues to be a challenge for individuals with disabilities. However, there are options that exist supported by government agencies and social organizations within local communities. As there are too many to list within each county in Georgia, we recommend families start with their local churches, charitable nonprofits, single women's shelters, and city government housing assistance offices, more commonly referred to as housing authorities. Housing authorities acquire the bulk of their funding through the U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Most cities in Georgia have a housing authority office where families can apply for subsidized housing assistance in one of the Authority's apartment housing developments, or for public housing vouchers through the authorities' formerly known Section 8 programs, allowing low-income families with children the opportunity to rent single family homes in neighborhoods. Homeless individuals can qualify for several benefits such as rental assistance up to 3 months, assistance with their utility bills and even assistance with rental deposits and food. At the federal level, there is the Housing Urban Development's (HUD) 811 PRA Mainstream program which provides permanent housing options for adults with disabilities ages 18-61who can't live independently and would be at risk for homelessness without this option.

Other federal housing options include **tenant-based housing**, a **voucher program** that allows the voucher to travel with the tenant should they decide to move to another community, and **project-based housing** which, like public housing authorities, allow individuals and families the opportunity to live in public housing developments.

Homeless individuals and families can also reach out to state offices like the **Georgia Department of Community Affairs** office inquiring of the **Georgia Housing Voucher Program, Rental Assistance, Emergency Shelter and the Rapid Rehousing programs**. The **Georgia Department of Community Affairs** can be contacted at 404-679-4840, https://www.dca.ga.gov/safe-affordable-housing/rental-housing-assistance. Families can also contact their local **United Way** for shelter and housing options by simply calling 211. There they'll be able to get a list of local community organizations that offer a variety of housing options.

SERVICE DOGS

DISCLAIMER: Between the application process and receiving a service dog could take up to 2 years. Most of the suppliers that donate dogs free of charge have long wait lists, and most trained dogs are at least 2 years old before they are paired with a handler (i.e., the applicant). If you're needing a service dog sooner, you may consider purchasing your dog. The rates for certified service dogs range between \$15,000-\$20,000. Some suppliers will offer financial assistance, and many families start GoFundMe pages to support their purchase of a service dog. Another option that could lower your cost so you may acquire a certified service dog sooner, is to seek suppliers that offer training programs for an applicant that already owns a dog. Training dogs that already have owners could significantly lower the cost of securing a service dog. The list below is suppliers that provide service dogs free of cost to approved individuals, and those that train and sell service dogs.

- **105. 4 PAWS FOR ABILITY, INC:** dogs are trained and places over 120 trained, service dogs to support the complex needs of disabled children and adults. Applications can be found on the website. There is a waitlist to receive a dog.
- 106. CANINE ASSISTANTS: (LOCAL) created to assist disabled individuals through specific programs. We provide and train service dogs for specific disabilities. We do not provide service dogs for emotional support, autism spectrum disorder, psychiatric service needs, guide dogs or signal (hearing) assistance. Please make sure to read our preliminary application requirements as non-eligible applications will not be considered. There is a waitlist to receive a dog.

- 107. CANINE COMPANIONS: train and provides dogs as service dogs, facility dogs, veteran support, and therapy dogs. Our dogs support the needs of children (must be at least 5 years old), adults and veterans. We are a national organization, so you'll likely work with one of our regional chapters that will be responsible for training and providing your dog. There is a waitlist to receive a dog. Dogs are at least 2 years old before their matched to an approved candidate.
- **DULEBOHN DOG TRAINING:** serves the needs of families with disabled loved ones who own a dog that requires specialized training to support their complex daily living needs. We offer 3 types of training programs via puppy training classes, residency programs and private lessons where we train your dog based on your specific needs. Our staff possess 30 years of experience and are Master Trainers and behaviorists with clients all over the world. The founder of Dulegohn Dog Training is also Director of Training with 4 Paws for Ability.
- **109. GUIDE DOG FOUNDATION:** donates guide/seeing eye dogs for legally blind individuals 16 years and older. If accepted all services are free including travel. Lodging and lifetime aftercare support services. For Georgia residents, you'll likely be paired with a dog from UGA which has one of the largest puppy raising programs in the country.
- **110.** GUARDIAN ANGELS MEDICAL SERVICE DOGS: provides service dogs through donation. If an applicant is approved for a dog they'll need to provide their own transportation to Williston, FL to be paired with a dog. There is a waitlist.
- 111. HIGHLAND CANINE SERVICE DOGS: (LOCAL) primarily trains dogs for service certification. Dogs can be trained and purchased based on a customer's needs. Most of their dogs are trained for and sold to military and law enforcement agencies. We also trained and sell dogs to support daily, long-term needs of disabled individuals. There are several dog training locations throughout Atlanta: Marietta, Kennesaw, Woodstock, Acworth, Roswell, Sandy Springs, Alpharetta, Canton, Jasper, East Cobb and Ball Ground
- **112.** PAWS FOR LIFE: (LOCAL) provides support for children, adults and veterans requiring service dogs and trains them to work for the needs of the client. Also trains dogs that are already owned by a family. Will assists family with fundraising to lower the cost of purchasing a service dog.
- **113.** PILOT DOGS: provides **seeing eye/guide dogs** to visually impaired and legally blind individuals 16 years old and older. If accepted to the program, applicant receives a guide dog free of charge.
- **114.** ROVER CHASE FOUNDATION: supports the independence of individuals with disabilities and to facilities like hospitals by providing highly trained service dogs to them.
- **115.** SD GUNNER FUND: (LOCAL) created to assist Veterans and disabled children with the financial expense of owning much needed service animals.

- **116.** TAO K9 UNLEASHED: (LOCAL) provides training for dogs needing to be certified as service/therapy dogs. They also operate a rescue where dogs can be fostered or adopted.
- **117.** ASSISTANCE DOGS INTERNATIONAL-global authority in assistance dogs industry. Provides a global search tool for consumers seeking service dogs.

TRANSPORTATION

MEDICAID TRANSPORTION: Non-Emergency Medical Transportation available to Georgia Medicaid members needing access to health services and do not have a transportation option.
